



From the Parent/Guardian:

Update Contact Information:

- Notify current homeschooling authority or local school district of your move.
- Update your address with medical providers, insurance companies, and any other relevant institutions.

Prepare Educational Materials:

- Inventory and pack homeschooling supplies, books, and resources separately from other belongings.
- Create a travel kit with essential educational materials to keep children engaged during the move.

Establish Routine:

- Plan a new daily schedule for homeschooling to integrate the new environment and routines.

Research New Area:

- Investigate local homeschooling laws and requirements in the new state.

- Identify local homeschooling groups, co-ops, libraries, and recreational facilities.

Check for DODEA (Department of Defense Education Activity) Support

- If moving overseas, explore whether DODEA offers homeschooling support, such as access to extracurricular activities, libraries, or other resources for military homeschoolers. Also, apply for the Non- DoD School Program (NDSP) if applicable: <https://www.dodea.edu/non-dod-schools>
- Contact your School Liaison Officer at new duty station.

Homeschool Records:

Collect Records:

- Request transcripts, evaluations, and other educational records from your current homeschool evaluator or provider.
- Gather copies of standardized test results and any special education documentation (e.g., IEPs, 504 Plans).

Transfer Records:

- Ensure records are sent to relevant parties in the new location, such as new homeschooling authorities or educational providers.

Store Documents:

- Pack records in a clearly labeled, secure folder or box for easy access during and after the move.

Homeschool Information:

Curriculum Review:

- Update or adjust your curriculum to comply with new state educational standards if needed.
- Prepare any new curriculum materials or resources for the new educational environment.

Legal Requirements:

- Research and understand the new state's homeschooling laws, including notification requirements and curriculum standards.

New Homeschool Setup:

- Organize a dedicated homeschooling space in your new home, and set up any necessary equipment or resources.

Other Documents and Examples:

Important Documents:

- Collect and organize essential documents such as medical records, immunization records, and any legal paperwork related to homeschooling.
- Keep these documents in a secure, accessible place during the move.

Examples of Records:

- Sample lesson plans or portfolios showcasing your child's work.
 - Previous assessments or evaluations that might be useful in the new educational setting.
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Special Programs' Records as Appropriate:

Local Programs:

- Research and reach out to local homeschooling co-ops, clubs, and support groups in the new area.
- Find out about community resources such as enrichment programs, extracurricular activities, and educational workshops.

Special Programs:

- Look into any state-specific or local educational programs that could benefit your child, such as gifted and talented programs, special education resources, or academic clubs.

Online Resources:

- Explore online educational resources or virtual co-ops that may offer support during the transition period.
